## **Tuesday, January 10, 2012**

*"Captain Joseph Boyce and the 1st Missouri Infantry, CSA"*

William C. (Bill) Winter, author of the well known *"The Civil War in St. Louis: A Guided Tour"* will discuss *"Captain Joseph Boyce and the 1st Missouri Infantry, CSA"*

## **Wednesday, February 15, 2012**

*"Women Spies in the Civil War"*

Lt. George E. Dixon Camp Compatriot Walter Hall describes some of the most notable women spies, North and South, including Belle Boyd, Rose Greenhow, Elizabeth Van Lew and Emma E. Edmonds.

## **Tuesday, March 13, 2012**

*"The Bushwhackers War on the North Missouri Railroad"*

General Sterling Price Camp Lieutenant Commander Daniel Maltman will be speaking based on his thesis for his history degree at the University of Missouri Saint Louis, focusing on guerrilla attacks from 1861-65 and the damages done on the North Missouri Railroad from Warren to Macon County.

## **Tuesday, April 10, 2012**

*"Shiloh"*

St. Louis Public Library Reference Librarian Tom Pearson will present the story of the Battle of Shiloh, a hard-fought two-day contest in April 1862 that pitted Major General Ulysses S. Grant (USA) against General Albert Sidney Johnston (CSA).

## **Tuesday, May 8, 2012**

*"Family History"*

General Sterling Price Camp Compatriot William Mathis will make a presentation about his family's WBTS history, including his GG Grandfather, Robert Randolph Huddleston who was at Sullivan's Island the day the war started and ended up at Appomattox Court as a prisoner of war. Jeff Mathis, his direct named GG Grandfather, died at Point Lookout as a prisoner of war.

## **Tuesday, June 12, 2012**

*"The Beginnings of Guerilla War in Missouri"*

Bruce Nichols, author of *"Guerilla Warfare in Civil War Missouri, 1862"*, *"Guerilla Warfare in Civil War Missouri, Volume II, 1863"* and the soon to be released *"Guerilla Warfare in Civil War Missouri, Volume III, 1864 - 1865"* will talk about tradition from guerrilla war in the Carolinas during the Revolution with the "Swamp Fox" and others; General Price's appeal for volunteers in November 1861 to help him repel the invaders; Shelby's brief career in November 1861 as a guerrilla leader around his Waverly, MO home; a few other guerrilla groups in autumn 1861 around the state; southern recruits traveling to General Price burning railroad bridges as they traveled; Quantrill's beginnings as a guerrilla leader in December 1861 and development of force and tactics into early 1862; acceptance of tactics and weapons that worked for the guerrillas around the state, and how they exchanged ideas when they wintered in the South.

## **Tuesday, September 11, 2012**

### *“Newtonia”*

Retired U.S. Army officer and historian Michael E Banasik, author of *“Embattled Arkansas, The Prairie Grove Campaign of 1862”* and editor of (currently 7 volumes) of *“Unwritten Chapters of the Civil War West of the River”* will discuss the Battle of Newtonia, the opening action of the Prairie Grove Campaign and the only WBTS battle where organized Native American units fought on both sides.

## **Tuesday, October 9, 2012**

### *“Confederate Sea Raiders”*

General Sterling Price Camp Compatriot Charles Knight will discuss the role of the role of the seagoing raiders of the Confederate Navy. CSA Secretary of the Navy Stephen Malory determined to do all he could on a limited budget. Commerce raiding denied the enemy access to imports and tied up the US Navy in chasing raiders making the blockade ineffective. The most effective ships the Confederacy had were seagoing raiders like the Alabama, Nashville, Shenandoah and the Stonewall.

## **Tuesday, November 13 2012**

### *“The Cause”*

General Sterling Price Camp Compatriot John Harris will lead a discussion about what we mean when we salute the confederate flag with affection, reverence and undying devotion to the Cause for which it stands.

## **Tuesday, December 11, 2012**

### *“Prairie Grove”*

Retired U.S. Army officer and historian Michael E Banasik, author of *“Embattled Arkansas, The Prairie Grove Campaign of 1862”* and editor of (currently 7 volumes) of *“Unwritten Chapters of the Civil War West of the River”* will continue the story he started with the Battle of Newtonia in September with the story of the Battle of Prairie Grove.
